Each of the strategic goals feed into the vision in their own right however they are also interlinked.

Goal one is a focus on self - being our personal best and developing strong relationships with our learners, their families, and between teaching colleagues.

Goal two is where we learn about our local community, how we link to the land and stories of our region. Our localised curriculum is developed here. We aim to actively utilise resources and seek opportunities to contribute to our community.

Goal three ensures we have the right environment for learning, that the children have the teaching, tools and resources to achieve success.

News from the Board of Trustees

Recent ERO review

This year we have been working with Ruth Nicholas from the Education Review Office and in week 4 Ruth and a colleague visited to complete their final review. It was wonderful to be able to share the work that the team has been focused on. The final review is in draft form, however we would like to share some snippets with you.

Leaders and teachers are analysing student learning information more deeply to identify the impact of their teaching programmes. Students are benefiting from teachers' use of deliberate strategies to support their learning. This has occurred as part of teachers' Professional Growth Cycle where purposeful teaching has been well supported by professional learning and development, observations and feedback.

The school has made considerable progress in developing the local curriculum. The principal has approached this strategically, ensuring that teachers have input and gain a shared understanding of the overarching framework. The curriculum now provides increased guidance for teaching delivery. Progressions of learning are clearly documented. Curriculum coverage in all learning areas is being tracked. Students are learning across the breadth of the New Zealand Curriculum.

The board has carried out a useful evaluation of board effectiveness. A major outcome of this evaluation was to develop sound induction documentation and board systems to ensure all members have a consistent understanding of their governance role and how they work to support the principal's leadership. Following the appointment and induction of two new board members, the board participated in an NZSTA governance and management workshop. Board members now have a greater knowledge of their governance roles and responsibilities.

We are really pleased with our development as a board and look forward to continuing to support our school.

School Swimming Pool

The Board has been investigating the viability of retaining the school swimming pool. Many factors were considered including the cost to get the pool up and running, ongoing maintenance and availability of other learn to swim options.

It was decided that the Board would not retain the school swimming pool. Over the past 2 years a quality learn to swim programme has been facilitated by trained swim coaches at the heated Levin Aquatic Centre. This option will be in place for the coming years.

School Playground

The Board has received an independent review of the playground which identified some areas to focus on. We have decided to close the wooden fort structure to ensure it is safe for our children to play on. We will be checking the condition of the piles under the fort and replacing some fittings on the swings.

As we head towards the end of what has been another busy year. The board would like to thank Deb and the entire staff for all their hard work and achievement this year. We wish you all the best for the Summer Break.
